## Minn. asks drivers to brake for turtles

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Why did the turtle cross the road?

Minnesota wildlife managers say it's because turtles are trying to get from their winter homes to their warm-weather nesting areas. And the state Department of Natural Resources is urging drivers in Minnesota to give turtles a brake.

Carol Hall, an agency specialist in amphibians, says many turtles are killed on roads each year, especially during the nesting season.

The agency says drivers who see a turtle on the road should slow down and go around it. The department also says it's best to let turtles cross unassisted. If it's necessary to help, the department says to move them in as direct a line as safely possible.

Minnesota has nine turtle species, some of which are protected.

## CNN co-founder Wussler dies at 73

NEW YORK (AP) — Robert J. Wussler, a CNN co-founder who became the youngest president of the CBS television network when he took over at age 39, has died. He was 73.

Spokesman Arthur Sando says Wussler died June 5 at his home in Westport, Conn., after a long illness.

Wussler started his 21-year career at CBS working in the mailroom. He eventually became executive producer of CBS News, where he oversaw special projects including man's landing on the moon.

In 1978, Wussler formed his own production company called Pyramid Enterprises. It created syndicated programming for the international marketplace, specializing in Japan, France and the former Soviet Union.

In 1980, Ted Turner recruited Wussler to join Turner Broadcasting Systems and to help develop CNN.

Wussler won seven Emmy awards.

## Pipe bomb found outside VA hospital

BEDFORD, Mass. (AP) — Police detaining a man on an outstanding warrant outside a Massachusetts veterans affairs hospital got a surprise when the man's friend handed them a pipe bomb.

Police Sgt. Michael Cloutier says Sean Carney and Christopher McDonald arrived at the Edith Nourse Rogers Memorial Veterans Hospital in Bedford, where one was planning to attend a detox program Friday.

Cloutier says officers noticed alcohol in the men's car and detained Carney on an outstanding warrant. Police then went back to the car with McDonald, who handed over a pipe bomb and marijuana.

The state police bomb squad detonated the device. No one was hurt. It is unclear what they planned to do with the bomb. Authorities did not know if they have lawyers.

They will be arraigned Monday.

## Plane crashes into eastern Arizona school

EAGAR, Ariz. (AP) — A small plane nosedived into a high school in a small eastern Arizona town Friday afternoon and exploded, killing both people aboard.

There were no reports of injuries on the ground. Classes are out for the summer at the school, authorities said.

The Cessna circled the area two or three times before it suddenly crashed into the main building at Round Valley High School in Eagar at about 2 p.m., Apache County sheriff's Sgt. Richard Guinn said.

Show Low Fire Department spokesman Eric Neitzel said two people aboard the plane were confirmed dead but their names and hometowns were not available.

There was no immediate word on who owned the plane and where it was headed. But Neitzel said witnesses told authorities the Cessna took off from nearby Springerville Airport and experienced some sort of malfunction while it circled before veering into the school building.

Two hours after the crash, flames were still erupting 20 to 30 feet above the roof of the two-story school.

Fire crews from nearly a dozen small towns in the region raced to battle the flames. Officials evacuated homes in neighborhoods east and north of the school.

The school serves about 500 students in Eagar and nearby Springerville and is about 200 miles east of Phoenix. The blaze was contained to the main school building.

There was no indication that anyone was inside the school when the plane crashed.

State Treasurer Dean Martin, who was in Eagar, said he and others left their vehicles at the school before heading out on a forest tour. They drove off just minutes before the plane hit and looked in the rearview mirror to see smoke rising into the sky.

"Initially we thought someone tossed a cigarette butt," said Martin, a state gubernatorial candidate. "But shortly after, there was this massive fireball."

A Friday night event scheduled at the high school was moved to another building.

## Woman sentenced in counterfeiting case

GRAND FORKS, N.D. (AP) — A Grand Forks woman accused of making and using counterfeit money has been sentenced in federal court to six months of electronic home confinement.

Lolita Amick, 33, also was ordered to perform 300 hours of community service and spend three years on probation.

Amick pleaded guilty to a charge of trying to use fake money, and prosecutors dropped a charge of manufacturing money.

Police documents say Amick was caught last September trying to use a fake \$100 bill to pay for a pitcher of beer at a bar.

## Napoleon bans bar smoking

NAPOLEON, N.D. (AP) — Residents of Napoleon have decided to ban smoking in the southeast North Dakota town's two bars.

This week's vote was 263 in favor of the ban and 94 against, meaning three-fourths of voters approved the idea.

Bar owners were split on the issue. The Downtown-er Bar wanted to go smoke-free but Freddie's did not.

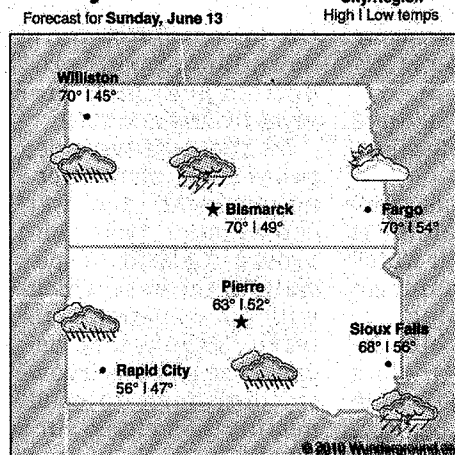

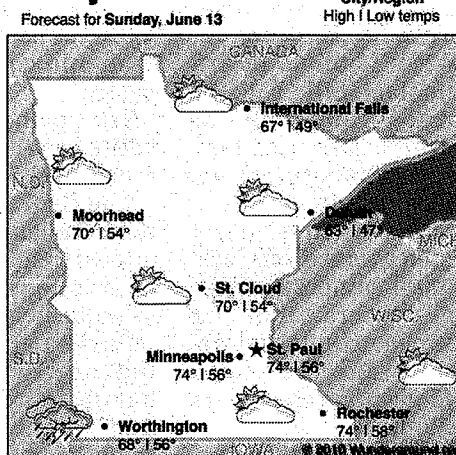

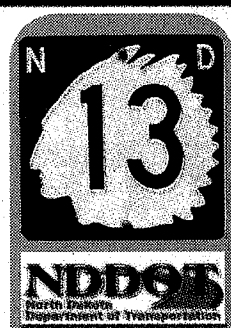
